STATE CHESS TOURNAMENT

The 1937 State Chess Tournament will be held in Livingston, Montana, on Sunday, April 11.

Registration of players will begin at 9:00 A.M. at the Masonic Temple. Drawings for the first games will be made and play will be held in the basement of the same building, starting at 10:00 A.M.

A registration fee of \$1.00 will be required of all players registering. This fee will pay for the banquet to be served at the Park Hotel at 1:00 P.M., and other incidentals of the tournament.

Each Club represented will choose not more than four of its members to register in Class A. These players will draw their opponents for the first game. The loser of the first game in Class A is eliminated from competition for a prize, but he may play any other person who is also out of competition. He may not go into another Class and compete for a prize.

All players not registered in Class A will be in Class B. Drawings will be made to determine opponents for the first game. The winners of the first game will go on to compete for the prize in Class B. The losers of the first game in Class B will form a third Class known as Class C. If the winner of the first game in Class B loses his second game or any subsequent game in Class B, he is out of competition and may not go into Class C.

In Class C, the winners of the first game in that Class (the second game of the tournament for those players) will continue to compete for the prize in Class C. If the winner of a first game in Class C, loses his second game or any subsequent game in that Class, he is out of competition for a prize, and may play anyone he wants to.

By a process of elimination, one player will be left in each class who has not been beaten. That player will be considered the champion of that Class. The Champion of the A Class, will be considered the State Champion. The best players should therefore be selected from each Club to play in Class A.

Individuals, not representing a Club, may play in Class A if they are on hand to register as such before play begins.

Livingston and Mammoth clubs, afdiliated with the National Chess Club association, are the hosts. Among Montana cities to be represented are: Billings, Hardin, Willow Creek, Bozeman, Great Falls, Big Timber and White Sulphus Springs White Sulphur Springs.

The Livingston, Mammoth, Billings and Hardin clubs, all members of the national association, staged a tourney at Billings recently, with Carl Spencer of this city coming out on top.

BOZEMAN MAN CHESS CHAMP

Doug Graham, with the Montana Power company at Bozeman, copped the class A state championship chess title at-the annual tournament of the Montama Chess association here Sunday. Graham defeated R. G. Turner of Hardin for the state championship, three games being necessary to decide the title, the first two ending in draws. Turner was awarded second place in the class A division; Keith Neilson, Mammoth Hot Springs, defending state champion, took third, and D. T. White of Mammoth, fourth. A. E. Davidson represented the Livingston Chess club in the championship bracket, but failed to please reining the common of legister. to place, winning two games and losing

Nearly fifty outstanding movers of pawns and kings from over Montana participated in the annual tournament. Winners in all divisions were awarded suitable prizes. The new state champion is a former member of the chess clubs at Los Angeles, and Manhattan, New York. Graham placed second in the Milwaukee city tournament in 1929 and once won a game from the world's champion, Dr. Alexander Alekhni.

In the class B division, Dr. J. T. Bradbury of Willow Creek took first, Thomas Gleason of Livingston second, John Kipp of Miles City third, and Dr. R. K. Maier of Livingston fourth. Cecil Crosby of Miles City won first in the class C division, C. V. O'Leary of Big Timber second, Vincent Rice of Livingston third, and J. S. Bliler of Clyde Park, fourth.

Sixteen players were entered in the class A division, 13 in the class C, and 16 in the class B. The class A division was determined by the entrants themselves. If players believed themselves of championship calibre, they entered in that class. The balance were placed in the class B division and a qualifying round played. The losers in the qualifying round went into the class C division and the winners remained in the B class. Any player losing one game was eliminated from the championship. If two games were lost they were automatically eliminated from play.
