#### MONTANA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP CHESS TOURNAMENT

The 1939 State Chess Tournament will be held in Helena, Montana on Sunday, April 23.

Registration of players will begin at 9:00 A.M. at the Y. M. C. A. Club Rooms. Drawings for the first game will be made and playing of games to start at 10:00 A.M.

An entrance fee of \$1.00 will be charged all players registering. This fee will pay for banquet to be served at 1:00 P.M. and other expenses of the tournament. Contestants will please bring their own chess men and boards.

The Tournament is to be conducted on the three class basis; i.e., "A", "B", "C", and a first prize to be awarded the winner of each class.

As an innovation we are going to ask Class "A" players to record their games for the purpose of awarding prizes for best played games and most brilliant plays. These games will also be published in various Chess publications of the Nation, affording Montana valuable notice in the world of chess.

Each club should designate their Class "A" players upon registration. All other players will be entered in Class "B" for their first game. The winner of the game to remain in Class "B" and the loser to be relegated to Class "C". After classification, the Tournament will proceed in the elimination process; losers automatically out of the Tournament and winners playing winners until one is champion in each class.

The best players of each club being registered in Class "A", the winner of that class will be adjudged the Chess Chempion of Montana.



Individuals not representing a club may register in Class "A", if they so desire, and are registered before any playing has begun.





## In Last Chance Guich

Should you walk down the. street today take a look in Fligelman's window at the chess men and board which are there to advertise the Montana State Chess association's tournament which gets under way here Sunday at the Y.M.C.A. There's an interesting, colorful history behind that chess board that should give every person who is interested in deeds of the old days a thrill, for the board and men were carved by E. R. Hart, father of H. L. Hart of Helena, while be was being held a prisoner of war in Savannah during the unpleasantness between the states in 1863.

Captain Hart, who served with Company H of the rugged First Vermont heavy artillery, was captured by the Confederate army and placed in a prison at Savannah, Ga. Naturally, the life of a prisoner is irksome and to while away the time Captain Hart conceived the idea of carving a set of chess men from the limb of a live oak tree which overhung the prison wall. So he asked the prison guard if that would be agreeable and the guard didn't see why it wouldn't. Thereupon, using the knife which you will see reposing in the window with the chess board, he set to work on his whittling project. • - • • • • • • •

And while the circumstances un-

der which Captain Hart carved those particular chess men are interesting, careful scrutiny of the men themselves will show you that this artillery officer also knew how to handle a knife. There's a wealth of detail in those men which is quite amazing, particularly when you consider the size of the knife that he used.

In looking at the men you may get the impression they're varnished and painted but as a matter of fact they're not. Captain
Hart took soot from the bottom
of a bean pot to color the black
men and grease from the inside
of the pot to polish the whole set.
Not a bad idea.

Later he was transferred to Libby prison, which was the officer's prison at Charleston, Va., and took the chess men along with him, thinking that it might be possible to get into a game now and then. It was. He and his companions carved out a crude chess board on the floor of the prison cell and indulged in many a contest. The floor, incidentally, also served as the bed because there was nothing else upon which they could sleep.

MONTANA STATE CHESS ASSOCIATION FIFTH ANNUAL TOURNAMENT

The Fifth Annual State Chess Tournament was held in the Helena Y. M. C. A. symmasium Sunday April 23, 1939. Forty - eight players entered the match altho several more were there acting as Kibitzers

The class "A" was won by J. W. Murray of Billings when he makes defeated H. L. Hayward of Butte. The class "B" honors went to Keith Neilson of Yellowstone Park after vanquishing H. L. Maury of Butte. Class "C" laurels were won by R. R. Frazier of Big Timber after he eliminated William Schenk of Bozeman.

Allen Rousch was awarded the Brilliancy prize for his game against Maury in which he won position and a Rook in an exchange thereby winning the game. Dick Young of Helens received an award for his game against Brandt.

Dick Young of Helens made a gallant effort in behalf of Helena by winning from Dr. Frazier, Mr. Corwin and Mr. Brandt only to go down defeated by Mr. H. L. Heyward of Butte in the fourth round (semi-final) who in turn was defeated by Murray from Billings for the coveted State crown. (Young of Helens is a 16 year old High School Senior)

H. L. Maury of Butte last year's class"A" champion was downed in his first game by Allan Rousch, a student of Montana State College at Bozeman. The victory for Rousch was a distinct upset as Maury is one of the state's strongest players and one of the very few able to carry on 10 or 12 games simultaneously.

Dick Young's little brother ( 11 year's old) made a hit in the contest by winning two games, one from E. A. Edwards the 1935 class "A" champion.

A banquet was served in the "Y" dining room at one o'clock, after which, a short business session was held. Mr. Bowden saxwhitems State President welcomed the visitors to Helens, have the same state end was also in charge of the business meeting. #### CHESS IN MONTANA

Chess has been played in Montana for years altho no definite organization of the game was in effect. Records show that Helena had chess players long ago as fifty years past altho no clubs were organized at that early time.

Previous to this decade cities that did have clubs rarely had an opportunity to play clubs of other cities due to the inconvenience of traveling long distances over roads that were to say the least, deplorable; but conditions have changed in the last ten years . and Montana's highways are on a par with any in the United States. To-day Chess enthusiasts travel 400 to 500 miles to attend a one day tournament with none of the adaptament misery attributed to auto travel of much shorter distances in by-gone days.

The Annual tournament is an important and anticipated event to the Montana Chess devotee, here he has an opportunity to contest players he has not seen for a whole year and more than likely will not see until the next meeting comes around; so he takes advantage of the fact by really staging a chess marathon. (This year's Tournament lasted nearly ten hours of actual chess play, in one day; so it is apparent we down the game.)

In 1935 a group of Chessers from the southern part of Montana met to-gether for a tournament and called the organizations. "The Montana State Chess Association". More than fifty players from seven southern Montana cities participated. E. A. Edwards of Livingston won class "A"crown. Dr. Ivan Budaeff of Yellewstone Park runnerup. He has copied master's games for a number of years and to-day has over two thousand games copied in his own handwriting.

A class "A" player at this years tournament was G. W. Cook of Lewistown. Mr. Cook is 85 years young and only lost one game, showing the value of years of chess practice.
