## MOORE-MAURY MATCH May 25-26, 1945

Reluctantly, we cancelled the 1945 tournament. Perhaps we should have held one, but it would have been largely a local affair. Manhattan had managed to put on a nice tournament in 1944, though the strength of the class A field was not up to par.

So the challenge by H. L. Maury, former champion, was a pleasant surprise. The challenge was promptly accepted, and the match was played off in a delightfully informal manner, without publicity and with only a few casual visitors from the chess faithful of Billings. I recall visits from Zimmerman, Pearce, and Olsen.

Maury was in good form—the kind of form that is usually good enough to win a championship. I was playing better chess than I have ever showed in a tournament. And I could do no wrong. I retained the title with four wins and one draw.
