VanTeylingen, architects, and a local resident for more than 25 years, died Tuesday night at a local hospital where he had been under treatment for a month. Futhe George Co.

VanTeylingen was born Nov. 19, 1891, at Rotterdam, Netherlands. During his career in Great Falls he designed many of the city's prin-fice at Havre which is operated cipal buildings and was associated by a son, Andres VanTeylingen. in designing many other structures in the state.

Some of the projects with which he was associated in-

clude the Civic Center, Medical Arts Building, Great Falls High School, Butte High School, an addition at the State Hospital at Warm Springs and a church at Havre.

He was active in Masonic work and was advanced to a 33rd degree Mason in 1941. He was past master of Euclid Lodge No. 58, AF&AM, past venerable master of the Great Falls Lodge of Perfection, past commander of Great Falls Council of Kadosh; a member of Scottish Rite Bodies in Great Falls, Knight Commander of the Court of Honour and proclaimed Inspector General, honorary, after being instituted as a 33rd degree Mason in 1941.

A veteran of World War II, Van-Teylingen was appointed a major with the U.S. Army Engineer Corps in 1942. He later worked in Greece and other European countries with UNRRA 'as rehabilitation engineer.

VanTeylingen was elected vice president of the American Institute of Architects in 1951 and in 1952 was named president of the Montana chapter of that organization.
