The 38th Annual Montana Open was held May 12&13 it at the Rimrock Lodge Billings, Montana. The facilities provided were more than generous with a large room and a smaller kibitzing room adjacent; the annual banquet was held Saturday night May 12 at the Fireside room of the Rimrock Lodge, a beef dinner was provided and it was decided to hold the tournament at Glendive, Montana at the discreation of Tai Hum, president, to appoint a secretary from the Glendive area(Tai's address is as follows: 1304 N. Meade Glendive, Mont. \$9330) a vote of thanks was given to the directors, Rick Likens of Hardin and K.A. Shinn of Billings. The tournament battle itself was hotly contested with three past champions in attendance; (they were Wally Albert 1966, Tai Hum 1970, and Larry Ross 1972) and half (8) of the "A" section finished with a plus score (a score of at least 3-2(a win counts 1 a draw 1/2 a loss 0)). There were 32 people in attendance 17 in the "A", 11"B", and 4 Junior. The winners were in "A" a three way tie was the result with Wally Albert (Missoula, Mt.), K.A. Shinn (Billings, Mt.), Tai Hum (Glendive) ally Albert was given the 1st place trophy and traveling plaque on the basous of his tie break points (because of three finishers in a tie for first it could not be decided on a simple who beat who basous); in the "B" section another tie occured with John Ward (Tacoma, Washington), Peter McKeon (Butte, Montana) but the tie was easily broken for John Ward met and defeated Peter McKeon in the first round; in the Junior section the tournament was conducted somewhat unusually because of the small number of enterents in that section. Each player played two games in the "B" section and also played each player in the Junior section Dan Clark won the first place by virtue of his 2 1/2 points against the other juniors. At three long tables, 32 chess players basked in that silence Saturday at the Montana State Chess Tournament at Rimrock Lodge.

They sat, balding and bearded, young and old, overlooking their checkered battlefields plotting and executing strategy.

Their weapons were inch-high pawns and five-inch kings of wood and plastic.

The serious nature of the games were revealed in the furrowed brows and fidgeting hands of the participants.

By Saturday afternoon, the players were in the second round of the two-day tournament which ends Sunday and already the room had

Cans of pop and cartons of root beer had replaced all but one of the vacuum bottles of coffee that had been at the sides of players during the morning round.

The only steady source of noise was the ticking of the twin timeclocks at the side of each of the 16 game boards used to record moves per hour.

At long intervals, someone would quietly say "check" breaking the silence for a moment before it flooded back through the room.

When the boards are finally cleared at the closing session Sunday afternoon winners in three classes will accept trophies from the Montana Chess Association — probably quiet-
