

STEVE SMITH WINS MONTANA OPEN TITLE

Wyoming's Steve Smith journeyed to Montana once again, and took home another Montana Open Title with a 4.5-0.5 score good enough for clear first. Steve arrived as the new Wyoming State Champion (for the seventh time) after finishing as the top Wyoming player in the Wyoming Open just two weeks before. Montana's Mike Jensen, Zygmond Mayer and Paul Motta were tied for second place, all with 4-1 marks.

GREG NOWAK WINS MONTANA GRAND PRIX TITLE .

Despite skipping the Montana Open, the final event on the Grand Prix calendar, Missoula's Greg Nowak took first place in the Montana Grand Prix competition with a total of 44.06 points. Greg's "secret" was taking first place in all the tournaments he played in. Zygmond Mayer, of Billings, secured his second place standing with a solid third place on tie breaks at the Montana Open. to finish with over 39 points. Paul Motta was third with about 24 points, followed by Mike Jensen (22) and Romie Carpenter (17). Nowak and Motta qualify for the State Closed as Mayer is already in as defending Champion. Other qualifiers from the Montana Open are Mike Jensen, Michael Long and Thad Suits.

RICHIE HARRIS WINS THE MONTANA HIGH SCHOOL CHAMPIONSHIP AGAIN

The second High School Championship in Montana was held concurrently with the Montana Open in Bozeman on May 30-31, 1992. Once again an attempt was made to assemble six regional champions, but the field was reduced to four when players were unable to attend. A double round robin format was adopted allowing each of the four to play both Black and White against each opponent. Missoula's Richie Harris swept the competition, scoring a perfect 6.0-0 in the two day event. Each State's High School Champion is invited to play in the Tournament of High School Champions held during the U.S. Open, but we have not yet reached the point where the MCA is committed to provide financial assistance to future champions for the trip to the national contest.

NEW BYLAWS RATIFIED

The MCA officially adopted a set of Bylaws to formalize the traditional rules and past resolutions of the MCA and strengthen the framework for the future promotion of Chess in Montana. The tally of votes of the Board of Governor's was 4 in favor with one abstaining, on a body of 19 Bylaws. President Paul Motta received the ballot report from Secretary/Treasurer, Bill Lynch, and certified the ratification process at the MCA business meeting in Bozeman. Thus the new bylaws are in force for the current MCA year. A copy of the Bylaws will be mailed to all current members in the near future.

GREG NOWAK CONTINUES TO ROLL AT THE MIDSUMMER OPEN

Adding to his successes as reported in this issue by Sherwood Moore, Greg Nowak added the Midsummer Open to his string of tournament victories, defending his Midsummer "title" from 1991. This year's Midsummer Open had twice as many participants as last year, at twentyn players, but none fo the players could keep Nowak from coming out on top with a 4.5-0.5 score. A visitor from California, Mark Denihan squeezed into second with a 4-1 score (including a draw and a half-point bye). The top pair outdistanced the next five players tied for 3rd-7th at 3.0-2.0, including Paul Motta, Romie Carpenter, Nick Pazderic (back for a visit from his sojourn to Taiwan), Dan McCourt and Steve Maquire. The latter was best under 1700, while James Maquire and Louis Partney had the best scores under 1500 at 2-3.

MOTTA WINS 1991-1992 MONTANA POSTAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Paul Motta, now living in Missoula, compiled a perfect 6-0 score in the 7 man round robin competition for the 1991-1992 Montana Postal Championship. MONTANA CHESS ASSOCIATION BUSINESS MEETING . . . Bill Lynch

The annual business meeting was held in Bozeman, Montana on May 30, 1992. The following is a narrative report based on conversations with those in attendance. The meeting was called to order by President, Paul Motta.

Under old business, Paul informed the members in attendance that the new bylaws had been passed, and would take effect as of the first of June. Efforts on the high school championship were reviewed, with general agreement that the process needs improvement but should be continued. The financial statement was reviewed: Bill Lynch had submitted a Treasury Balance Worksheet based on the calendar year showing an end balance for 1991 of \$305.22, which was a net loss of \$558.07 from year end 1990, which was the result of match expenses coupled with a decline of income due to drop in membership. The checkbook balance prior to the Open was \$312.51 and memberships were on the rise.

The following New Business was then brought forward:
1. Site for the 1993 Montana Open Tournament. Nomination were received and seconded for Bozeman and Billings. Bozeman won a close vote of 12 votes to 10 for Billings, and Bozeman was thus selected as the site for next year's Open.

2. Options for finding a new editor for Montana Chess News were discussed, as Bill Lynch has been having a lot of difficulty keeping to any kind of regular schedule. No

decision was made, but it was agreed that the new officers should continue to look for an alternate.

Nominations and elections for the new officers were then conducted. Nominations were as follows:

President Thad Suits Executive Vice President Zygmond Mayer Western Vice President Eastern Vice President Romie Carpenter . John Kennedy Secretary/Treasurer Bill Lynch

All of those nominated were duly elected to serve for the 1991-1992 year.

TOP RATING GAIN AWARD TO RICHIE HARRIS

Montana's top Jumior player has been improving rapidly, and that improvement is reflected in his achievement of the greatest rating gain (by a player with an established rating) between the 1990 and 1991 Annual Lists. Harris started the year at 1427 and posted a year end rating of 1646 for a gain of 219 points. Bob Melquist of Havre receives honorable mention for his increase of 224 points over his provisional rating of 1033 on the 1990 list. Other established players doing well in 1991 included Sherwood Moore +97, Kip Limesand +74, and Arman Goplen +73 Limesand +74, and Arman Goplen +73.

HARRIS SNARES 1991 UPSET AWARD

The biggest upset of the calendar year in open tournament play between contestants with established ratings was achieved by Missoula's Richie Harris. Harris defeated Thad Suits of with Great Falls at the Crocus Open in Missoula where Suits was rated 1927 and Harris was rated 1504, for a difference of 423 points. Sherwood Moore's defeat of Mike Jensen at the Montana Open was a very close second with a differential of 404 points (Jensen 1994 - Moore 1590).


