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# MCBROOM SWEEPS UCCC 3RD SUMMER OPEN KUBA \& FELDSTEIN TIE AT BEARTOOTH MOUNTAIN STUBBERUD WINS BOBCAT LOY WINS ANDROMEDID ACTION OPEN ERICKSON WINS UCCC 1ST FALL OPEN CARPENTER NAILS 1ST AT CHINOOK 



N1estled high in the fir trees of the Beartooth mountains, lodges \& cabins, tents \& cars were temporary homes for eighteen hearty chess players / nature lovers who converged on Cooke City,
 Montana for three things - chess, scenery and prize 88. There were copious amounts of each.

John Kennedy's Game-in-1 brainchild featured two-hour between-round respites and an early departure time, allowing players to poke around nature trails and eat meals with family \& friends, a rarity in tournament chess.

Esprit de corps filled the playing sfte at registration time as familiar faces produced a reunion atmosphere for players from several states, but camaraderie went dormant at the boards as the strategists and tactictans sought advantage. Surviving as the flttest, J. C. Kuba (Belgrade, MT) \& Bob Feldstein (NY) emerged Kings of the Mountain, sharing the big prize $\$ \mathbf{8}$.
GRISLY DETALLS INSIDE

Cooke City:
The Beartooth Mountain Open was a strong one, with very exciting games going on at the top boards y roundl J. C. Kuba from Belgrade, Montana scored 5 points out of 6 , tying with Robert Feldstelin who flew out from New York, NY. These fellows split the first \& second prizes of \$150 \& \$50, netting \$100 each.

Young Eric Jones, from Wyoming (rated 1447), must've discovered some long lost secret of chess, for he came, saw and conquered several players way out of his league (ratings-wise), causing ratings to fall - like autumn leaves. This kid [Mr. kid, Sirl] beat J. C. Kuba (1900). drew with Ron Matous (1904), beat Les Brennan (1831). drew with Zygmond Mayer (2045) and beat Robert Martin (1509). John C. Thompson was the only player who got the upper hand over Jones!

Another young fellow, Seth Uptain, was also beating up on his higher-rated competition. Seth (rated 1685) drew with Johansson (2114) in the first round and upset Les Brennan (1831), turning in a very fine tournament performance, with 3.5 points. Robert Martin earned the $\$ 50$ Biggest-Upset prize however, for his win over Zygmond Mayer ( 536 upset points).

Other prizes: Top A - Michael Long (\$50). Top B - Seth Uptain ( $\$ 50$ ), Top C - Eric Jones ( $\$ 50$ ). Top D - split between Don Price and Eriel Maver (\$25 each).

For some odd reason, few score sheets with Robert Feldstein's name on them were found in the pile of stuff submitted to the editor, and anly one of those were decent enough for transcribing. MCN usually tries to present a fair representation of the winner's glory, but in this event, with sudden-death time controls and messy. unfinished score sheets, there just wasn't enough to go on. There are some good games from this event though, that did, however, prove to be complete and decipherable, and these have been included in this issue. These games should show, to some extent, the excitement generated by the steady flow of upsets, especially by the young Wyoming player Eric Jones.

What the reader will not be able to apprectate, however, is the incredible beauty of those mountains, the fresh air, the fun of eating lunch with old friends at the alfresco cafe with the wooden sidewalk, snd, of course, the fantastic finishes of the topboard games that finished in scrambles, but were either indecipherable, or not turned in (which underscores the need to try and turn in good score sheets far the newsletter).

If your label indicates that you are not current, and you disagree, chances are I messed up. or the tournament director who took your renewal money messed up. Kip Stubberud took perfect First Place (\$40) at Bozeman's Saturday G/90 Bobcat Open, winning games against Jan Johansson, Zygmond Mayer, J.C.. Kuba and John Murray.

Eriel Mayer [You've heard that name a lot lately in discussions on upsets.] fought to a draw with Michael Long, winning the Biggest Upset prize (\$5) and the Best Under 1800 prize ( 810 ) on his road to clear Third Place ahead of Zygmond, his father who came in fourth place. ALL-RIGHT ERIELt YOU DA MANI WOOF, WOOF, WOOFI (Excuse me)

Logan Suriano (who is almost ten years old) won the Best Under 1400 prize by winning against Hal Amundson, who has just returned to chess after his recent return to Montana from Idaho.

Jim Loy captured the First Place spoils (\$20) at Bozeman's Sunday G/30 Andromedid Action Open, scoring 4.5 out of 5 .

Eriel Mayer again took the Biggest Upset prize ( $\$ 5$ ) by beating Robert Hull.
In the final round Scarff stopped Hull with a nine-move BDG, good for the Best Under 1800 prize ( $\$ 10$ ). Steve points out that after just eight moves the position is a clear MATE IN NINEI Hull resigned after seeing just the first move of this forced mate! Seeing is believing! You'll absolutely have to check this game out on page 81

Chinook:
Carpenter won clear first (\$75) in. Great Falls with a sure-fire strategy, namely, Just mow everybody down like gress! Romie felled such stately figures as Johansson. Motta and Skóvron and could have lost his fifth round game and still tied for first, but ended up drawing with (ahem) Les Brennan, clinching clear first. Jim Skovron, utilizing Thad Suits' computer pairing program, punched up the players' performance ratings after the tournament, reveaing that Romie had a 2133 performance rating at the Chinook Open. Well, he was hot!

Some notable upset games were Doug Hansen's Grob-busting defeat over Zygmond Mayer in the first round (294 upset points) and Nick Doulas 'win ( 544 upset points) over Doug Hansen in the third round, executing mate with a three-way knight fork of Doug's King. Queen and Rook (the stuff dreams iare made ofl), winning the Biggest Upset prize in the process. Those games are included in this issue. Enjoy!

The Chinook was an MCA Grand Prix event and the race is onl Romie natted 11.49 GP points. Johansson 10.35 . Brennan 9.19 and 5.75 points went to each er with a score of three wins, namely. Zygmond Mayer, David Duke. Paul Motta, Skovron and Sherwood Moore. Jan is now the GP leader with 18.725 points. David Duke and Zygmond Mayer follow with 14.125 points each, Paul Motta 11.799.

## David Duke solves "MATE IN FIVE" in four moves!

The Sept. - Oct., 1994 issue of ROCKY MOUNTAIN CHESS featured a chess puzzle on page 15 with the caption: "WHITE to move and mate in five!" and lists the following moves:
$\begin{array}{ll}\text { 1. } \mathrm{Bh} 5+\mathrm{g} 6 & \text { 2. Nxg6 fxg5 3. Nh4+ Rg6 }\end{array}$
4. Bxg6* Kf8 5. Qf7++ (diagram below)

David Duke points out, however, that if Black does indeed play 2... fxg5, the puzzle becomes a mate in four, e.g.
3. Nxe5+! (3... any) 4. Qf7++.

The position in the diagram is still a mate in five though, based on the best possible moves on both sides, e.g. after 2...Rg7 (protecting f7), 3. Nxe7+ forces mate in five total moves - 3. Nxe5 is now rendered weaker, I think (3...Kf8). Correct me if l'm wrong! - Editor

> Romie Carpenter reports that the NEW IN CHESS Yearbook \#32 takes a good hard look at the statistics on this age-old question made famous by remarks from the likes of Bobby Fischer, to wit: From a database of 337,730 master games. White won $55.1 \%$ of the time. White won $54.3 \%$ of the time with 1. e4 openings ( 156.688 games [62,514 of them Sicilians]) and $56.3 \%$ of the time with 1 . d4 openings ( 141,259 games). Where the e4 openings had the most difficulty was with the Sicilian Defense. winning only $52.6 \%$ of the time.

## From Dave Shughart

As to the new format for the closed championship, all of the arguments against are, in my opinion, valid. As a TD, I think the pairing problems would be hard to resolve to the satisfaction of everyone involved in the tournament. The round-robin format, as Bill Lynch pointed out, provides for head-to-head competition and is selfpairing. The only gripe that I ever had about the old format is that it does not always produce a clear winner. The same can be said for the Swiss system. An option that might be considered is a four round Swiss, with a tie breaking game or games to provide for a single champion.

I wholeheartedly agree with Mr. McBroom's recommendation that the MCA business agenda be published in advance of the yearly meeting. This would allow for members not in attendance to vote by proxy on issues that affect them and the games they play in Montana.

I would like to address the comments made by Bill Lynch. Sherwood Moore and Romie Carpenter about our new format for the State Championship.

As far as I am aware, these three gentlemen have never played in the six-man Closed, nor ever even watched a major portion of one of these tournaments. That's not meant to belittle anyone, but rather to point out that the aforementioned gentiemen have no actual working experience upon which to base their very strong objections to the big improvement that has been made to Montana chess.

I have played in two of the sixman Closed tournaments and know something about them:

1) The first thing that happens in these events is that a handful of paper bits is handed out for the players to draw from. Three of the players receive 3 white and 2 black pairings and the other three receive 2 white and 3 black pairings. In other words, pure blind luck plays far too heavy a role in deciding upon who would be the state champion. No high-level round robin in the world does anything this inane. They solve color disparity by playing double round robins, thereby removing the major source of pure blind luck.
2) An overwhelming majority of our membership, including members who have played in the sixman Closed, as well as former state champions, voted in favor of this big improvement to Montana chess.

That's what really counts, so let's spend our time enhancing what we've got to work with in Montana chess instead of desperately trying to find fault with it. The vote is in and the will of the finest chess players in Montana has been made clear.

Let's work with what we've got in a constructive way rather than blindly clinging to outworn ideas and poorly constructed systems. The Montana State Closed desperately needs the new life it has been given.

## Montana Chess Members.

The MCA Board of Directors wants your thput. Below are four questions presently being considered by the Board. While some discussion has already been printed on these questions. this is a notice that the Board expects to vote on these questions on December 31. 1994.

## Question \#1)

Since the next Montana State Closed involves ten people, should the Board declare, at the Montana State
Open, the date, time and location for the State Closed?

The general consensus is that the Board should [do this] because in the past, scheduling for the six-person Closed has been a difficult process.

## Question \#2)

Should the Bylaws be amended to require prior publication in the Montana Chess News of the agenda for the Montana State Open Business meeting?

This amendment would require prior publication of all proposals and motions that would be up for a vote at the Montana State Open business meeting.

## Question \#3)

Should the MCA have a proxy voting system, so MCA members who are absent from the Montana State Open business meeting can still vote on agenda by having another member vote for them?

Other organizations have proxy systems - The USCF for example. By having the business meeting agenda publicized before the business meeting, members will know the issues, and with a proxy system, a member can still vote even though he/she may not be able to attend the Montana State Open.

## Question \#4)

Should the MCA provide free first-year MCA memberships for first time tournament players who are joining USCF for their first time?

This gesture would remove the added cost burden for new players, and maybe answer the question of the "sanctioned" tournaments. MCA could require state association membership for all tournaments advertised in MCN, and new players wouldn't have to pay for it.
