Judson Temple, a native of Bozeman who is now practicing law with a firm in Sillings, has earned the 1977 State Championshio with $\approx$ fine $4 \frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ nerformance in the 43 rd Annual Open Tournament, held this year in Bozeman. His victory continued ? remarkable personal record of successes which now totals 2 ? conseoutive U:GCF roted tournament pames without a loss and three consecutive tournament wins. Judnon thus succeeds the 1976 Chamnion, Robert Goble, of Bozeman, who won the title in Great Fills.

Roberto Barajas, of Grnat Falls, finished second with a strong 4-1 showinf, and Roland Brodniak, of Kalispell, placed third with an identical score a splendid finish for an unrated player particinatinf in his second tournament.

At the annual business meeting following the traditional banquet at the state tournament, Butte was the unanimous choice as the site for the 1978 Championship, and Gordon Shuck, of Whitehall, was elected unanimously to serve as President of the Montana Chess Aseooiation for 1977-78.

Following the olection, Tim Estle of Bozeman, at the request of Kennedy Poyser, chief editor of the magazine NORTHWEST CHESS, presented a prodosal for the Montana Chess Association to affiliate with the Northwest Chess Federation. After considerable discussion, the proposal was rejected by a large margin. The oonsensus of opinion was that the Northwest Chess services would represent an unecessary duplication of those presented by the USCF and an additional expense to Montana's serious players.

A brief discussion of the future of the newbletter MONTANA CHESS NEW; led to a resolution to support the costs of the publication through voluntary donations at Montana tournaments.

Roberto Barajas, of Great Falls, spoke of the fine job done by Bob McKinnon as MCA President despite his reluctance to serve two consecutive terms, and found those in attendence in agreement with the general principle that it would be best to elect a new President each year, preferably someone from the city selected as the site for the state tournament.

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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:
The first three issues of MONTANA CHESS NEWS constituted an experiment to see if there was sufficient interest across the state to justify and support a regular chess publication. The response has been gratifying, and I have received encouragement from Martin Morrison of the USCF as well as from local players and organizers. In fact CHESS LIFE \& REVIEN listed the newsletter as the official publication of the Montana Chess Association, which is not the case.

Jim Loy, of Bozeman, and earlier, Bob Perry, of Kalispell, sugfested that MCN should appear frequently, and on a regular schedule. I have come to agree, and therefore propose to publish six issues in the coming year, which will appear as soon as possible after the first day of July, September, November, January, March, and May. This appears to fit well with the current schedule of tournaments across the state.

I would like to invite all players to contribute material which may be of interest. Every offort will be made to include games, analysis, tournament announcements, tournament reports, letters to the editor, MCA business or other items received by the last day of the month preceeding the publication of each issue. One item I would like some help on in the near future is alisting of local Chess Clubs with their meeting places, times and days of meetings, mailing addresses, officers, etc.

The MCA has decided to support MCN for the immediate future on a limited basis by means of voluntary contibutions collected at tournaments held in the state. This has been done already at the YMCA Open and the State Chamoionship with enough money raised for this issue and perhaps the next. Ultimately, I believe that a subscription rate will be necessary, either indepently, or as a part of an annual MCA membership fee should the newsletter become the official state publication. A few more issues will clarify the cost picture, but it appears that one dollar per year per person would cover expenses. At this time I would like to close by appealing to those non-tournament nlayers who enjoy receiving MOMPANA CHESS NEWS to send a contribution to support its continuation in the coming year.
