## SEIRAWAN TO HIGHLIGHT MONTANA OPEN

Yasser Seirawan, rated 2495 in the FEB-APR USCF list, will perform a simultaneous exhibition to highlight the activities at the Montana State Tournament. A 19 year old International Master from Seattle WA, he recently completed a very successful trip to the 1979 Statham Masters Plus tournament at Lone Pine, CA where he scored $5 \frac{1}{2}-4 \frac{1}{2}$ while playing 8 Grandmasters in 9 rounds. He lost only to eventual co-winner Vlastimil Hort(CZECH) while defeating GMs Anthony Miles (ENG) and Bent Larsen (DEN).

Provided with a complimentary review copy of this new book, I was treated to an interesting in depth comparison of Fischer's abilities to those of the great Champions of the past with particular emphasis on Capablanca, Alekhine and Dr. Lasker. Dr. Euwe, himself a former world champion, provides very thorough analysis of key games (all complete games with numerous diagrams) which he feels highlight the comparitive strengths of Fischer and these three players. Also included are some of the games Fischer has played against those former World Champions still living - Euwe, Botvinnik, Smyslov, Tal, Petrosian and Spassky. Most experts agree that studying Master games is a good way to improve ones play. As this book contains games of the world's best players it is highly recommended for such study, though the complex analysis may be best suited to Class C and stronger players. There are a few printing errors, but I found none that could not be decifered. Perhaps the only dissappointment was a lack of a difinitive answer to the question asked in the title. - WML
