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JOHN R. BARTO HONORED

The Policy Board of the United States Chess Federation, during meetings held in conjunction with the U. S. Open on August 16, 1983, unanimously passed a resolution introduced by President, Tim Redman commending "John R. Barto of Great Falls, Montana for more than 50 years of dedicated service to the game of chess." That recognition was very deserved by our 1982-83 President, who first held that office in 1947-48. He first became active in chess in Great Falls in the early 30's, and by 1939 was traveling to Billings for the 4th annual tournament of the Montana Chess Association, which had been formed during a gathering in Livingston in 1935. In 1940, when play was convened in Great Falls, he found himself serving as "acting secretary" of the Association. After terms as President in 47-48 and 52-53 he became the elected secretary in 57-58, 63-64 and 67-68 and returned as President in 71-72. Over the years he was largely responsible, along with Mr. Herbert A. J. Wendel of Butte, another frequent Secretary of the Association, for the preservation of a marvelous legacy of Association records from 1935 to the present including all of the Montana Open Tournament winners, finances, meeting minutes and complete tournament crosstables since 1953. He had some fine successes as a player along the way as well, including a second place in class A in 1950 (the top section was AA that year), equal 1st but second on tie-breaks in 1954, and 3rd place in 1960 (the latter tournaments being single section Swiss events). He has always been a steadfast supporter of chess in Great Falls, where the chess club often has met in his home, and throughout the state of Montana. It is with great pleasure that we take this opportunity to join with Tim Redman and the USCF Policy Board in saying - THANK YOU JOHN!

right, along with the \$100.00 first prize, with a perfect score of 5 pts. The five way tie for the combined 2nd and 3rd prizes resulted in \$15.00 each for Ray Jorgenson, Jim Loy, Gordon Shuck, Kip Stubberud and Doug Fletcher. There was also a tie for best under 1600, with Roger White, Dan McCourt and Gregg Ford splitting \$12.00 with scores of 3. Matt Janke's 3 points was enough to give him best under 1400 all to himself. The best under 1200 was split between Garry Moore (Sherwood's son) and J. T. South. Both of these young players earned two full points each. Ryan Stuart of Missoula won a beginners section with a score of 4, and with it a USCF membership.

RD5 BD1 Jensen-Stubberud SMITH-MORRA GAMBIT ACCEPTED After the game, Mike commented that in Romie's absence (he is in Colorado indefinitely) someone should play the Smith-Morra. Here, Mike gets all one could ask for out of a gambit opening. Even an argument that 10 R-Q1 was the "wrong" Rook has no force after 20...R-N1 when White takes comfort in having an uncommitted Queen Rook. Of interest is the fact that White makes 10 Queen moves in the last 15 moves of the game--those that do not make threats counter the threats that Black is working on. RD2 BD1 Loy-Shughart ENGLISH Black's doubled heavy pieces on White's 2nd rank look ominous, but he doesn't get a chance. Jim produces a pretty mate with a discovery (26 Ng5+) and a Queen sacrifice (27 Qe5+) in which the capturing pawn allows Rd8++. And, of course leaving the Queen leads to mate. RD5 BD4 Blaco-Jorgenson PETROFF'S DEFENSE White's 22nd and 23rd moves illustrate a way to save a threatened piece. With opposite wing castling, both sides try to concentrate forces to threaten the other King while protecting their own. By move 32 the concentration of pieces on the Kingside is most formidable after White has given up a piece to open lines. RD3 BD5 Ahern-Stubberud SICILIAN (Hyper accelerated Dragon) After the first 25 moves of
maneuver and exchange of minor pieces, Black infiltrates his Queen to the 2nd rank. And,
Black has been in time trouble for the last 5 moves, with 5 to go. White sacrifices the
exchange when a Black Knight joins the Queen, but in partial compensation White finds an
excellent post for his Knight (which also blocks the only open file). For a dozen or so
moves after the first time control there is more maneuvering and infiltrating. When the
Queens come off the board, being down the exchange proves to be too great a deficit. Af-
ter the game Ted suggested 43 Rd1 (rather than the actual 43 Qf1). Yet Kip is in time

RD5 BD12 Petrak-Janke FOUR KNIGHTS White's early sacrifice of a Bishop has the desired
effect of keeping Black's King in the center. With both Rooks trained on the King, open
lines, and the Queen in the center, it seems the sacrifice was justified. But, White then

RD3 BD8 Mostad-Ford QUEEN PAWN (Semi-Grinfeld) This game is a good reminder for all of
us that ranks can be every bit as important as files. Here the checking 9...Q-R4 attacks
the Bishop. Yet, rather than scoop up the luckless Bishop immediately, Black first exch-
anges Queens and draws the White King off it's square. Once Black's King Rook gets on the
7th rank, there is a further example of the power of lateral movement. (cont'd page 6)
