## STUBBERUD TOPS AT MONTANA OPEN CTUBBERUD, BURKE WIN CROCUS SECTIONS

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The 1984 business meeting of the Montana Chess Association was held at 1:00pm, May 13, at the site of the Montana Open in Missoula. As President Tim Hovet was engaged with his Open directing duties, the meeting was conducted by Treasurer, Bill Lynch. The Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$237.10 compared to the 1983 balance of \$219.94 (After a net expense of \$15.25 for the 1984 Open, the balance is \$221.85). No dues increase was recommended as continued cost control measures appear adequate to maintain the treasury.

First order of business was selection of the site for the 1985 Montana Open, which will be the 50th. Dave Shughart suggested we return to the site of the original 1st Open, but as this was in Livingston, which is not currently active in MCA, the pro- al was dropped. Helena was nominated and received general support as centrally located, as the state capitol for our 50th and as preserving the tradition of moving the tournament each year, and was approved handily over several other cities.

Prior to electing officers, Bill Lynch made a motion that the elected positions be changed from President, V.P., Sec., Treasurer and Junior V.P. to President, Eastern V.P., Western V.P., Secretary/Treasurer and Junior V.P. This was seconded and then approved. Elections followed and the following slate was approved: Kip Stubberud-President, Chuck Chapman - Eastern V.P., Dave Shughart - Western V.P., Bill Lynch - Secretary/Treasurer and Steve Olson - Junior V.P.

Under new business, the following motions were made and approved:

1. That the seeding of the Montana Closed Championship playoff be revised to include the top 2 (two) Montana finishers in the Grand Prix, reducing the number of qualifiers from the Montana Open from 4 (four) to 3(three).

2. That the MCA President shall arbitrate and dispute over the site for the Montana Closed playoff should one arise amongst the six qualified players.

3. That the Grand Prix year be revised to begin after the Montana Open each year and conclude with the following year's Montana Open. The current Grand Prix year shall run from January 1, 1984 through the 1985 Montana Open.

4. That the Secretary/Treasurer shall notify the USCF of all official news for the record, particularly the name of the current State Champion.

5. That bthe Association shall make appropriate awards to the State Champion and the Grand Prix Champion and that the organizers of the Montana Open shall designate \$1.00 per player of the entry fees collected for this purpose.

sussion followed about the need for better publicity and a full schedule of tournaments all across the state to celebrate the 50th year. Also, Bill Lynch indicated he is working on a revised formula for Grand Prix points to account for tournament strength, to be put into effect this year.

Open Champion Title for 1984. Tim O'Connor and Stewart Sutton, both from Idaho, took second and third places respectively. Special guest Eric Tangborn of Oregon, drawn in Round 4 by Mike Jensen, had to withdraw to catch his plane home, and finished seventh.

Stubberud, Ron Erickson, Darren Stacey and Bill Lynch qualified for the Montana Closed Championship Playoff, joining the seeded players - Mike Jensen and Jim Loy.

Erickson and Stacey also claimed the Montana Senior Champion and Montana Junior Champion Titles, respectively, with their  $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  scores.

Bill McBroom's 3-2 was tops in the best under 1600 category, Gary Wendel got best under 1400 at  $2\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$  and Phil San Angelo was best under 1200.

While far short of the biggest, this was one of the strongest Montana Opens, and another very well run event. Tim Hovet did a fine job directing, and the host Missoula Club provided excellent facilities and hospitality once again.

Compared to a similar exercise reported in 1979 (MCN Vol IV-Issue 5) a couple of things stand out. First, White's winning percentage is virtually unchanged, but the number of draws in the previous sample (of 295 games) was only 2%. Second, the percentage of 1 P-K4 games in 1979 was 64% whereas 1 P-K4 accounts for only 46% of these 1984 Montana Open games, most of the shift going to 1 P-Q4 games - which may be a bit odd, considering the winning percentages noted above.

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Games from the Montana Open and the Eric Tangborn simultaneous exhibition should ear next issue. Jim Loy has also sent along some interesting materials on postal cass with computers which can hopefully be squeezed in. - ED

Mike Jensen won the UCCC Spring Open with a perfect score of 3 in the premiere section of this all round-robin event. Bill McBroom was the winner of the second section with  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , and Tom Mostad's  $2\frac{1}{2}$  gave him undisputed first place in the remaining section. This tournament saw the return of Bill Egger, direct from the National Open in Las Vegas.

14th move, both of Black's Bishops are

trained on the White fortress while supporting the advanced pawns. The somewhat odd looking recapture 18...BPxR not only adds to Black's Pawn center, but holds the possibility of advancing the Pawn which just came to the King file in order to drive the Knight, unmasking a menacing Queen-Bishop battery. The power of the two Bishops is well demonstrated in the middlegame. Black has a long diagonal for each to the Kingside and open short diagonals on the Queenside which allow shifting them to make and meet threats. On move 33 Black finally parts with one in a combination which wins a Pawn and breaks open the castled position. RD3 Erickson-McBroom BIRD'S OPENING: FROM'S GAMBIT ACCEPTED With 4...g5 Black selects Lasker's variation, a line where many of the moves are forced. 10...Be6 looks like a blunder allowing the Pawn fork 11 d5 (not played in the actual game), but 11...Ne5 hits the White Queen gaining the tempo needed to move the light-squared Bishop. By opting for the Knight maneauver with 22...Nd8 Black misses a combination (22...Reh8 was indicated) which wins a piece.
