Romie Carpenter upset top-rated Paul Motta, then held off challenges by Les Brennan and Ted Catton to win the Valentine Open with a 4.5-.5 score. Motta finished alone in second place followed by four players tied at 3.5-1.5. Ted Catton took the third place trophy, while Brennan received the medal for best under 1700.

Newcomer Mark Horton had the best score under 1500, and Miroslaw Szulczynski finished highest of the under 1300 players.

Dan McCourt directed the tournament and will send some games for the next issue of Montana Chess News.

Paul Motta of Ennis has surged into the lead in the competition for the 1987-88 Montana Grand Prix Title. His total of just over 29 points gives him a 6 point lead over Kip Stubberud. Bill Greer is just one point back in third, while John Thompson's 20 points is good for

fourth. There is another gap of 7 points to Les Brennan, at 13.20. With three events on the calender there could still be a horse race to the finish at the Montana Open, but Motta definitely has the inside track. The Montana Grand Prix Champion, and the second place finisher in the competition are seeded into the State Championship playoff. John Thompson is already seeded into the playoff as the reigning state champion (on tiebreaks over co-champions Kip Stubberud and Ron Erickson). The remaining three slots in the playoff will be filled by the top three Montana finishers in the Montana Open.

The Southeast Sudden Death Open in Colstrip, MT on March 19 drew 28 players (!!) from Sidney to Paradise, and from Great Falls to Sheridan and Powell, WY. Everyone was eager to test their chess skills against the clock in this new format for tournament chess. Lots of things are different - for instance there is no waiting around for that last long game to get done from the previous round, and there are no heavy sighs of relief after a flurry of moves to meet the time control. The pace is no where near as furious as in five-minute blitz, but there is nonetheless a compelling urgency about the need to make a decision on every move. Most players who rose from the board to fetch a cup of coffee (provided by the Montana Power Company - thank you) found their cup full and cold - the next time they thought about it. When the dust settled after Round 5, it was hardly a surprise to find Wyoming's Steve Smith on top with 5-0, or John Thompson and Paul Motta tied for second at 4-1 with Tim Kipp (all three victims of Smith!). However, Bill Lynch and Les Brennan were a little distressed to find their tallies at 2-3! Some newcomers faired quite well - posting 3-2 scores near the bottom of the wall chart. There was excitement every round - games drawn when both flags fell, Smith finding himself with mate against Thompson with two seconds left on the clock, Bill Greer surrendering a draw through stalemate just moments from a win. But is this really chess worthy of rating points you ask? I don't think it will ever replace the desire for the two day swiss with the two hour time control - but I would suggest: Try it. I think you'll like it. Try as much as I can to be despondent over the 30 rating points that I'm sure to lose - I can't fight the reality that I just had one whale of a good time! And lest I forget - many thanks to Les Brennan for putting it all together!
